WASHINGTON, FEBRUARY 12: Early American music of Washington's time will be played on Washington's birth-day, February 22nd, by the National Gallery Orchestra conducted by Richard Bales, it was announced today by David E. Finley, Director of the Gallery.

A feature of the program will be a Suite of music by Colonial composers arranged by Mr. Bales. This consists of works which, on the basis of contemporary records, are known to have been heard by General Washington. The concert is at 8:00 P.M.

At the same time, it was announced that the 300th public concert at the National Gallery will be held next month, on March 21st. At this concert, a milestone in the music program at the Gallery, Luigi Silva, cellist, will be heard in a program of classic and contemporary composers.

Many leading musicians have appeared as guest artists at the Callery, but special emphasis is placed on younger artists, many of whom have been presented to the music world in this way. During the war numerous concerts were given by artists in the armed services.

The Callery also has its own Orchestra, with Richard Bales as conductor, and is composed of thirty players.

Concert programs at the Gallery often feature
the works of contemporary composers. More than 100
works have been played at the Gallery for the first
time in Washington, thus providing a unique opportunity
for the study of trends and achievements of contemporary
music, and particularly music by American composers.
