FOURTEENTH AMERICAN MUSIC FESTIVAL AT THE NATIONAL GALLERY OF ART

Washington, April 16, 1957: John Walker, Director of the National Gallery of Art, announced today that the Gallery's Fourteenth American Music Festival will be presented on successive Sunday evenings from May 5 through May 26. Four programs will be played, including orchestral, chamber, piano, and vocal music.

The series is under the general direction of Richard Bales, who will conduct the National Gallery Orchestra in the final program of the Festival on May 26. Premieres of compositions by Richard Bales, Jack Beeson, and Charles Sorrentino will highlight the series. The programs also include first Washington performances of works by David Broekman, Henry Cowell, Richard Cumming, Charles Hommann, Jack Frederick Kilpatrick, Robert Palmer, and Virgil Thomson.

These concerts will be given in the East Garden Court, beginning at 8:00 P.M. There is no admission charge, and tickets and reservations are not required.

The Festival will be broadcast in entirety by Station WGMS, Washington's Good Music Station.
