SUNDAY EVENING CONCERTS BEGIN 35TH SEASON
AT NATIONAL GALLERY

WASHINGTON, D.C. September 3, 1976. With a program of compositions by Charles Ives, W.A. Mozart, and Anton Bruckner, the National Gallery Orchestra will begin its thirty-fifth season of free Sunday evening concerts on September 26, 1976 at 7 p.m. in the Gallery's East Garden Court. Richard Bales, the Gallery's Music Director, will conduct.

During the fall, the Orchestra or guest artists will continue to highlight the Bicentennial by including American music. On December 26 a special program comprised entirely of American works will mark the close of the Bicentennial year.

On January 16, Mr. Bales' patriotic contata, "The Republic," will receive its traditional performance on the Sunday preceding the Inauguration of the President and Vice President of the United States, and a series of programs for piano will be offered from February 20 through March 13.

The concert season will be climaxed by the thirty-fourth American Music Festival, to be held between April 17 and May 29. Mr. Bales introduced this special spring feature in 1944.

The concerts will be held each Sunday evening through June 26, 1977.

They are broadcast live by Station WGMS (AM and FM) through the cooperation

of Local 161-710 of the American Federation of Musicians. Funds bequeathed to the Gallery by William Nelson Cromwell and F. Lammot Belin support the concert series.
