FILM PROGRAMS

<u>Art Nouveau 1890–1914</u>, a 15-minute film produced by the National Gallery of Art, is shown continuously in the exhibition. The film explores Art Nouveau style through works of art in the exhibition, architectural landmarks, interviews with scholars, and rare archival footage of the period.

A 30-minute version of this film is shown daily beginning at 12 noon in the East Building small auditorium, except November 23, December 24, and December 31. The schedule is subject to change. The film is shown also three times each week in the East Building large auditorium during the course of the exhibition (see Calendar of Events), and available on videocassette on a free-loan basis (see Education Resources below), or can be purchased from the Gallery Shops.

The Influence of Art Nouveau on the Cinema
